Timing and Penalties, what's important and what's not.

Penalties that commonly occur throughout the season;

- Non-conforming wheels 8.07. What is "pneumatic like"? Use of pneumatic tires won't automatically shield bands from penalty. Problems with the use of fixed direction, on-articulating wheels. Overweight, poorly engineered props/platforms vs. the number and size of wheels.
- Genset and acid battery fluid containment 6.04. Cookie sheet with a .5 inch lip? .25 inch Plastic corrugated surrounding genset on a flatbed garden trailer? Flimsy/cheap plastic tote.
- Props without edge protection drug about and put into position8.05. Wear and tear throughout season. It's not the field use that destroys a well designed and built prop, it's the loading unloading parking lot use that endangers their field worthiness. Please have someone check regularly. Use of PVC and plastics.
- Parent help on the field during the show, they can't help it4.02. With the weather always a factor, those parents holding props must know their role.
- Prop height, 12 feet 8.08. Platform height W/O a rail, less than 6 feet. Over 6 feet, proper railing restraint.
- One stroke, one vowel vocals during performance 6.01.
- Pre-show vocals that continue post announcement conclusion 5.06.
- Confusion on end zone entrance /exit. Prop exit 5.05.
- Adults clear of the performance area 4.03.
- Prop/battery entrance front 5.02.
- DM performing OB or accessing their instrument OB then stepping in bounds to perform 5.07.

High Cost Penalties that have occurred but are not commonly observed;

- Show over/under time. Delay of contest 5.08.
- Field damage, scaring, residue, fuel spill 8.03.
- Recorded music play back not following one stroke rule 6.01/6.02.

The Purpose of the T&P judge, we're there to help!

- The overall objective is to access zero penalties if possible. The role of the T&P judge has evolved from <u>reactive</u> <u>penalty assessment</u> (meaning the observation potential rule infractions, remaining silent, and then accessing the penalty if it did occur) to <u>actively help bands AVOID penalties that are potentially set to occur.</u>
- Manage the production of the show on time.
- Maintain a fair competition that all participating directors have agreed to abide by.

What can you control vs unforeseen penalties you can't control?

• To avoid penalties take charge of the mechanics of props, know and apply the rules to electronics and vocalizations used and contain batteries/genset safety guards.
